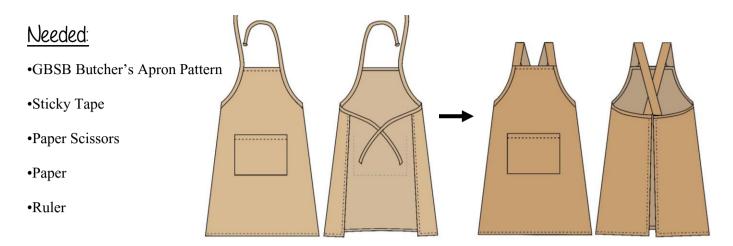
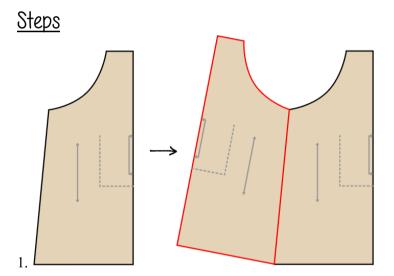
Apron Pattern Hack Guide



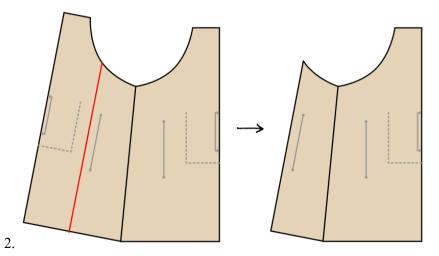
This document serves only as a guide. The pattern is a One Size Fits Most.

The fit is meant to be slightly loose for comfort.

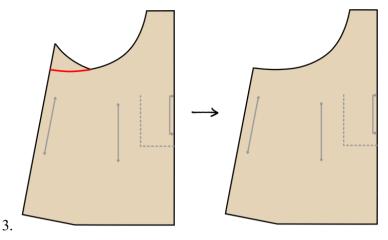
I suggest adding or deducting along the Centre Front fold line to make the apron bigger or smaller.



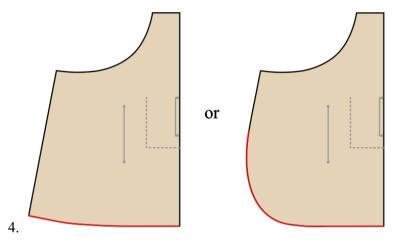
Duplicate and mirror the Apron pattern piece. Join both pattern pieces along the side seam.



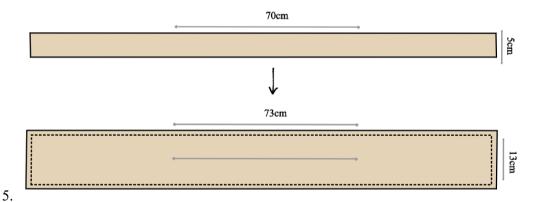
I suggest moving the Back seam so that the Back of the Apron doesn't overlap too much when worn. Where the Back seam ends is up to you, it depends how much of a cross over you want.



Shape the top edge at the Back. Continue the shape from the armhole.



Shape the Hem a bit so that the shape is slightly more curved. You could also curve the Back edge.

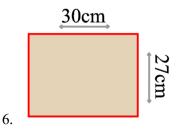


Draft a strap.

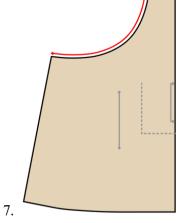
The length & width is dependent on what is comfortable for you. I used 70cm x 5cm Cut the straps on the fold or double the width.

Remember to add 1.5 seam allowences.

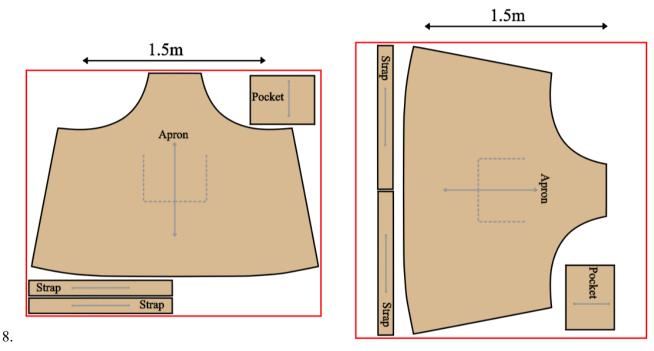
You may need to adjust the ends as you fit.



Draft a pocket that is 30cm x 27cm (you can make it any size, this is just what the pattern suggests)



Measure the Armhole/Back edge. Use this measurement to determine how much binding is needed. Remember to double the measurement as you need to bind both sides of the Apron.



When you cut out the fabric with your pattern, you should end up with:

- -1 x Apron (cut on the fold)
- -2 x Straps
- -1 x Pocket

If your apron pattern exceeds 1.5m at it's widest point, I suggest you then use the weft grain of the fabric as your grain line (as opposed to the usual warp grain). What ever your measurement is at it's widest point will determine the amount of fabric needed.

If your apron pattern piece doesn't exceed 1.5m, use the length of the apron + the width(s) of the strap(s) to determine the amount of fabric needed.
